Oyster reefs restore lost ecosystems in the bay by creating habitat. They also improve water quality thr biological filtration. New oyster communities will enhance and protect local biodiversity through the foraging areas for many species of fish and birds.

Oyster domes are constructed onsite Tampa Bay Watch headquarters by pouring marine friendly confiberglass mold containing a large round buoy surrounded by smaller rubber balls, creating the holes it domes. Microsilica is mixed with the concrete to balance the pH so oysters are attracted to the domestic domes

Tampa Bay Watch and the Tampa Bay Estuary Program have teamed up again to sponsor T Bay Scallop Search, a resource-monitoring program where volunteers snorkel and search f in select areas within Boca Ciega & Lower Tampa Bays. The purpose of this program is to document the health and status of the bay scallop population. Volunteers found only one li 2005 due to the severe red tide, 17.5 were found in 2006 and 555 scallops were found in see if we can find more in 2008! This is one of our most popular family events of the year spaces are already filled! Reservations are required to participate in the event.

About 45 boats with up to 150 participants will search selected sites in Boca Ciega & Lowe Bays for the elusive bay scallops. Bay scallops, or the Argopecten irradians disappeared f Bay in the 1960s when the bay water was highly polluted from dredging operations and inc municipal wastes. Tampa Bay's water quality and seagrass beds have since improved to lev once again support the bay scallop population.
