\$10,000 fee would be shared by the two cities. He would look to deposit the rocks on the existing Hempstead Town Reef, Fire Island Ocean Reef, Montauk Reef and Shinnecock Reef.

He is also in the early stages of developing a new reef site on the North Fork of Greenport. This plan, depending on the amount of donated services, will cost somewhere between \$6,000 and \$10,000. Steve is currently working on getting the required permit for this site.

THE FISHERMAN REEF. One of our sites in the Build-A-Reef[®] and the creation of The Fisherman Reef, built and paid for by Fisherman readers and supporters. Currently, the only new permit site is in Great South Bay, in the vicinity of the WB Buoy zone south Beach. Due from being the only new reef site with an open permit, it is also centrally located in the heart of the Fisherman's readership area.

One of the avenues being explored for this site, is the use of Reef Balls, a new concept in reef building. Reef Balls are placed in various sizes, shapes and constructed of concrete and additives such as Fibro 10,000. Reef sites which have incorporated this Reef Ball concept have shown excellent productivity and enhanced ecosystems. One of their biggest virtues is that they are totally safe for the environment. According to Steve Stein, a six-foot wide by four-feet high ball would cost approximately \$150. Ideally, this site could accommodate between 100 and 300 balls of this size, with the size of the reef expanded as more balls become available. Steve has already explored the possibility of using a DEC trailer for transporting the Reef Balls from Georgia along the wind. *No*
